Campus

Redwood High School occupies 57 acres with beautiful vistas of Mount Tamalpais in the background. A main academic building, industrial arts shops, fine arts facilities, four computer laboratories, a large gymnasium, fitness training center, practice gym, athletic fields, theater, Career Center, outdoor amphitheater, swimming and diving pools, and tennis courts make up the facilities. Redwood's library resources include almost 34,000 catalogued items and more than 100 print and online media subscriptions. In 2015, Redwood received a six year accreditation from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). In 2015, Redwood was selected as a California Gold Ribbon School and in 2008 Redwood was selected as a National Blue Ribbon School.

Community

Redwood is located just 11 miles north of San Francisco in beautiful Marin County, and serves the communities of Belvedere, Corte Madera, Greenbrae, Kentfield, Larkspur, Ross, and Tiburon. Parents of Redwood students average 4.36 years of university education and many are business and professional leaders. The Redwood Foundation provides over \$700,000 for academics, music and the arts and the PTSA provides parent education, campus beautification, school volunteers and staff appreciation.

Length of Semester/Day

Redwood High School has two semesters and 180 school days. Students are required to take six classes per day, and may choose to take seven. Classes are 50 minutes in length, except for two block days per week when classes meet for 90 minutes each.

Extracurricular Program

Redwood High School offers a full program of extracurricular activities which include more than fifty student clubs and forty-two interscholastic sports teams. The gym displays a large collection of pennants representing league, regional, and state titles earned by the teams. Curricular offerings include courses in instrumental music—jazz, symphonic and concert bands, Performance Workshop and guitar—as well as a comprehensive drama program which annually earns high marks in dramatic competitions, and is managed by the student-run EPiC Theater Company. The Advanced Journalism class produces the school newspaper, *The Bark*, which consistently ranks among the most highly acclaimed high school newspapers in the country.

Students are ranked only by decile - at the end of the sixth and seventh semesters. Decile ranking is based on cumulative, weighted academic GPA, with grades of A, B, or C in AP and Honors classes earning an additional honors point.
