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General Course Objectives:

Economics deals with choices. Economics studies how people confront the situation of having limited resources to meet unlimited wants. The guiding questions in the course ask how limited resources be allocated and the steps individuals, corporations, and governments take in deciding who gets what. This course will explore economics as the science of making effective choices or decisions by examining the alternatives possible.

Course Requirements & Expectations

Deadlines
