Progress Reports

National Merit Scholars

Every year the National Merit Scholarship Corporation conducts a competition that recognizes students throughout the nation for their exceptional academic promise. From the more than 1.4 million students who entered the 2008 competition by taking the 2006 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT), the top five percent are selected to receive letters of commendation.

A spokesperson for NMSC comments, "The young people named Commended Students in the 2008 National Merit Scholarship Program are distinguished by their strong academic performance in this rigorous competition. We hope this recognition will contribute to their educational opportunities and encourage all students to strive to realize their potential."

Tam High is very proud of these accomplished commended students: Robert Bruens, Jeeheh Choi, Ben Courtney, Christine Khademi, Alex Kithas, Adam Leuin, Katherine McNeil, Lisa Mithun, Max Ramirez, Anna Russell, and Rebecca Wheeler.

Of the 50,000 Commended Students, 16,000 are chosen as semifinalists. This year Tam has three semifinalists: Eric Brandon, Charlie Hartford, and Megan Orlando. These students may go on to become finalists in the competition and qualify for scholarships.

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Did You Know?

Tam's Academic Performance Index (API) score went up 51 points this year to an all-time high of 857. This was due mostly to the fact that students performed so well on last year's STAR tests. If all Tam students participate in testing and try their best this year, we might surpass Redwood's score of 871.

STAR testing is important! All 9th – 11th grade students will be tested April 21-25, 2008.

Tamalpais Union High School District Board Update

John Carroll was announced as the new principal at Tamascal High School. Mr. Carroll was vice principal at Drake and Mill Valley parents will remember him as a past vice principal at MVMS.

Two new programs were introduced and will be implemented in the district high schools:

Teen Screen – a national mental health and suicide risk screening program.

The Teen Screen program was developed at Columbia University. Locally the program is being sponsored and promoted by UCSF. UCSF has invited the district to participate at no cost except for staff time in assisting the implementation.

The program will launch in January. The goal is to get students connected with the appropriate help person and to make the student strong and confident. The one-year pilot will begin at Tam and eventually be expanded to encompass all of the district sties.

Safe and Drug-Free Communities Grant

The Alcohol, Drug and Tobacco Program for the county of Marin was awarded a \$1.1 million grant for a period of five years to work with

the district. The project will launch an anti-drinking program at the three large campuses (Redwood, Drake and Tamalpais). The targets will be 9th and 11th grades and binge drinking.

Surveys have shown that teen drinking in Marin is higher than both the state and national averages. The grant will bring in individual experts and agencies to work with students, parents and staff over the five-year period. Existing groups such as PTSA, Peer Resource, and Leadership will be invited to engage in the effort and will benefit from the resources. Teachers will receive current information, updated and evaluated instructional resources, and broad-based support.

The proposed outcomes are:

- 1. Reduce the number of students engaged in binge drinking.
- 2. Reduce the number of settings where youth engage in binge drinking.
- 3. Increase the number of students referred to community resources to address drinking behavior. •

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News from Parent to Parent Connection

Our first meeting of the year was very well-attended by 40 parents, in spite of technical difficulties that prevented us from getting a reminder out to our database!

Diane Provo was our speaker on September 19; she spoke on "A cooperative model for advocating for your special needs student: planning for high school success." To follow are the highlights and the most important "take aways" from her talk.

- Learn who the "point people" are at your school. Who you should go to for guidance?
- Create a binder on your child. Include any academic testing results, correspondence with teachers and support staff, IEPs (Individualized Education Plans), and notes about how your child learns.
- Learn what accommodations are available to your child without an IEP or a 504 plan.
- If your child has an IEP or a 504, learn what additional accommodations are available.
- If you do not know what an IEP or a 504 is, contact your child's guidance counselor. He/she will direct you.

At this point, Diane stressed that it is the parents' job to help their child navigate through high school. She challenges the traditionally held philosophy that we should "train our students to be independent learners." Rather, they should be "interdependent, creative learners, who know their own strengths and weakness and know how to get help."

In taking this approach, Diane states that if the parents are organized and work in an active partnership with the school, they will be teaching their children how to map strategies for success that they will carry forward with them in college and beyond.

Diane ended with a few words of advice for parents of kids with learning disabilities: Parents must never convey anger to their children. That is very damaging. She also encouraged us to remember that kids with learning disabilities are not in control of it. They are not willfully trying to be difficult. It is fitting into school that is difficult for them.

AIM To Embark on DC Trip

Tam Centennial: Tam on the Worldwide Web

Have you ever Googled the history of Tamalpais High School? My goodness what a wealth of information there is online. The first entry you will see is Tam100.org, the site for developing centennial news. Check it out.

A recent search produced a Wikipedia entry highlighting various school programs, notable alumni and faculty, and important events. One entry describes a1989-90 event I recall with pride when "members of the student body petitioned to formally remove the school's original mascot 'Indians' at the interdiction (sic) of Native American activist and Marin County resident Sacheen Littlefeather (a guest speaker at a school assembly who expressed her concern about her people being used as a school mascot)."

The Wikipedia entry on sports brings to mind the enormous impact the passage of Title IX in 1972 and the distinguished response of Tam PE teachers and coaches. Without hassle, PE classes became coed and athletic opportunities for girls mushroomed from virtually nil to a dozen teams.

Tam grad Skip Lacaze (1967) has assembled an excellent list of other Tam alumni including actress Eve Arden (1926), star of the TV show "Our Miss Brooks," Pat Paulsen (1945) of the "Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour" and perennial presidential candidate, prominent jazz all-star George Duke (1963), actress Kathleen Quinlan (1972) recipient of a 2007 Milley Award, and some of my own former students: actor Merritt Butrick (1977) son of Captain Kirk in "Star Trek" movies, academic all-star Peter Shor (1977) of MIT and a MacArthur Fellow, and Joe Breeze (1972), one of the central figures in the development of mountain biking. Upcoming Events

November 14: College planning evening for juniors and parents. Juniors planning to attend a two- or four-year college and their parents are invited to preview what is ahead on Wednesday, November 14, at 6:30 pm in the Student Center. The counseling staff will provide a general overview of the college admissions process and review the timeline for admissions tests, college visits, filing applications and financial aid.

December 4: College of Marin Representative to visit Tam. A College of Marin representative will come to Tam Tuesday, December 4, to talk with seniors who are thinking about attending COM next fall and to any students who may want to register for free classes there next semester. The representative will review the application process, describe the placement tests and explain how to transfer from COM to the UC and CSU systems and to private colleges.

December 1: Sophomores take PLAN. Sophomores may take the PLAN, a practice test for the ACT, at Redwood High School on Saturday, December 1, at 7:45 am. The PLAN tests English, math, reading, and science reasoning and includes a questionnaire on career interests. This test is good practice for the ACT, which is accepted equally with the SAT. The results are helpful in evaluating a student's interests and performance. The PLAN is given once a year. A letter has been mailed home to all sophomore families explaining the registration procedure.

December 6: Financial Aid Night. Olga Tapia, Ph.D., assistant director of financial aid at UC Berkeley, will be the guest speaker at Tam's Financial Aid Night on Thursday, December 6, at 6:30 pm in the Student Center. Dr. Tapia will give an overview of the financial aid process and review the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). All Tam families are welcome; seniors and their parents are encouraged to attend.

The FAFSA worksheet and GPA verification form for Cal Grants will be available in the College and Career Center in December. Parents who want a head start on the FAFSA may apply online now for a PIN at www.pin.ed.gov. The PIN will serve as your electronic signature when you apply online in January. The FAFSA web address is www.fafsa.ed.gov. The website for the PROFILE, a financial aid form used by many private colleges, is profileonline.collegeboard. com. The PROFILE may be submitted now.

The Green Sheet, Tam's list of local, general and school-specific scholarships, has gone online and is available on PrepHQ. To access PrepHQ, go to tamhigh.org, click on Academics and then Counseling. Follow the link to PrepHQ, sign in and click on Scholarships. The list is updated weekly.

College Applications

November 30 is the application deadline for all UC campuses and for CSU campuses at Fullerton, Long Beach, Pomona, San Diego and San Luis Obispo. November 30 is also the priority or first consideration deadline for all other CSU campuses. Make a copy of all completed applications for your files. UC and CSU strongly prefer online applications. The UC application is available at www.universityofcalifornia.edu/apply. To apply to the CSU, go to www.csumentor.edu.

Each year the UC computer network is jammed during the last few days of the filing period. UC and CSU accept no excuses for late filing. File your applications before Thanksgiving so that you can enjoy the holiday.

Help with applications is available throughout November in the College and Career Center. The Center has a guide to the UC application and paper copies of the Common Application.

SAT & ACT

You can download the 2007-2008 SAT and ACT testing calendars and register for either test by going online. For the SAT, go to www.collegeboard.com and for the ACT go to www.act.org. Register early for a convenient test site.

Students applying to the University of California must complete all testing by the December test date.

College Visits

Representatives from Colby, Harvard, Nichols (MA), Ohio Wesleyan, St. Mary's (CA), UC Santa Barbara, Western New England College (MA) and Willamette (OR) will visit Tam this month. All interested students are invited to attend. The list of college visits is updated weekly and is available online at www.tamhigh.org and PrepHQ. In addition, an Army recruiter will be on campus November 18.

The Marin County School to Career Partnership provides a link between high school students and the world of work. Since 1997, the School to Career program has created opportunities for students to "test out" possible career options by participating in internships, job shadows, informational interview- and career-related field trips and activities. Through our programs, we inspire students to think about and plan for their future in school and in the world of work.

Internships are offered three times a year; students can intern after school for eight weeks in the spring or fall or for six weeks in the beginning of the summer. Internships are available in a wide range of fields including health, business, art, automotive, environmental, architecture, education, technology, community groups and law.

In addition to internships, School to Career offers many field trips and other career-related activities. Activities planned for this year include tours of Marin General and Kaiser, architecture, engineering and construction job shadows, Law Day in conjunction with the Marin Bar Association, Grammy in the Schools, Buck Institute, and public safety careers and emergency preparedness training. Our goal is to help students catch a glimpse of their future and help them take the first steps toward realizing their dreams.

Internships

By the time you read this, students will be about half way done with their fall internships. This semester Tamalpais students are interning at Acqua Med Spa, RoCo Films, Courtyard by Marriott Hotel, Frank Howard Allen Real Estate, and the Tamalpais Centennial Documentary. Students must be available to work a minimum of six hours after school for the eight-week internship. Spring internships will begin at the end of February. Applications will be available in January.

Field Trips

Students interested in the healthcare profession spent the day on October 22 at Kaiser Hospital learning about possible career paths and opportunities as presented by doctors, nurses and other healthcare professionals. Another Youth Health Forum at both Kaiser and Marin General will be offered in the spring. On November 29, the School to Career Partnership, in conjunction with the Marin Builders Association and the Regional Occupational Program, will offer job shadows for students interested in architectural, engineering and construction-related fields.

Other School to Career Services

As the School to Career Liaison for Tamalpais High School, I am available in the College and Career Center on Tuesdays and Thursdays. I assist students with internship placement and preparation, finding job shadows and informational interviewing opportunities. I also help students with resume writing, interviewing skills, and provide opportunities for students to participate in career-related field trips and activities throughout the year.

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and confusion," agreed Kyra Hoge-Habekoss (Humpty-Dumpty) and Carson Schultz (the Caterpillar). As the story unfolds, Alice becomes very frustrated with her nonsensical world. She finds that she can no longer use her lessons, personal experience or conventional logic to make sense of the problems facing her. Many of the encounters in her Wonderland are unexpected and absurd as Alice comes across problems that have no solutions. Gigi Bustamante (the Rose) remarks, "She is facing the unavoidable difficulties of growing up, and trying to find herself and her way home."

Director Sheila Lopez has created various methods to attain these perspectives. Williams says, "Sheila has changed the traditional performance by using five Alice characters, each with different looks and personalities. We have a very large cast, and the performance is a really abstract movement piece. In rehearsals, we focus more on physical emphasis and blocking than anything."

Patrick Phillips (the Chesire Cat) adds, "The characters and personalities of the show are very complex. We are trying to bring out traits in the characters that may not be visible from the start. For example, the Cat has become a very intensely bi-polar character, and the Mad Hatter has a very adult side to him that is masked by immaturity."

For those who are familiar with Ms. Lopez's previous productions, this performance will use visual images and group movement that is often startling and provocative such as were seen in last year's CTE performance of "Silent Movie" and "Phillip Glass Buys a Loaf of Bread."

Reality is inescapable in the next play offered in November, "Dead Man Walking." This play is based on the book and the Academy Award-winning film of the same title and was adapted for the stage by Tim Robbins. CTE guest artists John Warren and Julia Mueller will direct the play that deals with the harsh reality of issues surrounding the death penalty. Collaborations with Social Studies and English departments have widened the scope of the production to include guest speakers addressing this issue and curriculum designed to culminate with "witnessing" the performances.

The story is based on real events and real characters. While "Alice" experiences the hardships of changing and growing up, the central character in "Dead Man," Matthew Poncelet (Eric Andrews), faces the death penalty for murder. He has to deal with the miserable consequences of his actions with

the help of Sister Prejean (Kate Marcom), a real-life nun who works closely with inmates on death row. The rest of the cast rounds out all the people affected by Poncelet's actions and the inevitable consequences. "Dead Man Walking" attempts to convey the complexity of death penalty issues involving social injustice, inequity and biases reflected in the application of lawful judgment we live under presently. This harsh reality is balanced in the story by human love, caring and understanding that is thought-provoking and often stirs our emotions.

Tennis and golf teams rally




